THE RUSSELL-BASSETT CASE.

An Unusual Legal Proceeding in Which Judgment is Rendered for the Plaintiff.

It was a case of unusual character which was given a hearing yesterday in the court of Justice Nichols. Lorenzo W. Russell was the prosecuting witness and the defendant was S. M. Bassett, of the S. M. Bassett Glass Company, of Elmer.

It was an action brought against Samuel M. Bassett, president of the glass company mentioned, for alleged violation of a section of the act of the Legislature of 1896 relating to corporations, which provides that if a stockholder of a corporation is denied by any officer of the said corporation the privilege of inspecting its stock books on his demand, the officer refusing him such privilege becomes liable to a penalty of \$200, \$100 to go to the State and the balance to the person aggrieved.

Mr. Russell's charge was that Mr. Bassett refused to allow him as a stockholder to examine the books belonging to the company. Mr. Russell gave as his reason for wishing to see the books that the certificates of five of the ten shares which he had bought had never been issued him. Carl S. Bassett, secretary of the company, was called upon by the plaintiff's lawyer, Mr. Mitchell, to produce the stock book and stock ledger, which he did.

Mr. Russell stated that it was on the 18th of July, '98, that he went to the office of the company to make the request to see the books, and that two fellow workmen, also stockholders, accompanied him. These men were John F. McIntyre and C. H. Garwood. Mr. Russell said that Mr. Bassett was not in the office but was summoned, and that he stated his errand, and that although the safe was open containing the books, he was emphatically refused permission to examine them. Mr. Russell said that he asked Mr. Bassett if his answer was final and he replied that it was. Mr. Bacon, counsel for the defense, cross examined Mr. Russell.

Mr. Garwood and Mr. McIntire corroborated Mr. Russell's testimony.

Carl S. Bassett, secretary of the company, was the only other witness examined. At the close of the arguments, Justice Nichols gave judgment against the defendant in the fixed penalty, which is \$200, and costs.

REORGANIZATION COMPLETED.

The final transfer of the stock of **S. M. Bassett Glass Co.** to the **Gilchrist Jar Co.** has been completed and the sign of the latter company will soon be painted on the factory. Last Monday the stockholders met in Philadelphia and elected the following officers: President, **W. E. Sharp**; vice-president, **S. M. Bassett**; secretary, **Charles F. Lumb**; treasurer, **W. D. Boyer**. The business offices of the company will be 524 Drexel Building, Philadelphia. **S. M. Bassett** will manage the factory here and **William Clark** will be assistant manager and **Newton Elmer** and **Frank Gibson** will continue to supervise their respective departments as heretofore. **Carl S. Bassett** will for the present continue to reside in Elmer, but will give his attention solely to selling the product of the factory.

Four glassblowing machines will arrive in a few days and be put in operation.

No information is given out as yet about whether the factory will continue non-union or change to union, and in consequence people are kept guessing on this point.—**Elmer Times**.
