Mrs. Bassett, who was 87, had been interested in temperance work from girlhood. She was an ardent worker in the cause during the saloon age and continued her interest after prohibition was granted. Until her last illness, she entertained the local union at her home and was always a most gracious hostess.

Funeral services were held Monday morning at 10:30 o'clock at the residence. Interment was at Overlook Cemetery, Bridgeton.
